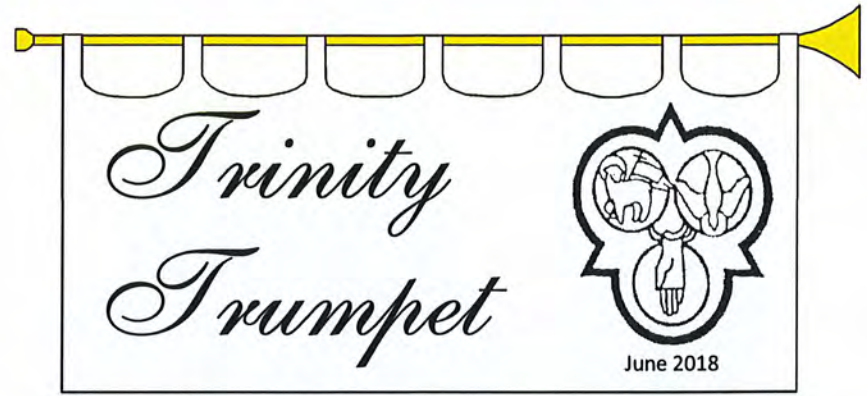


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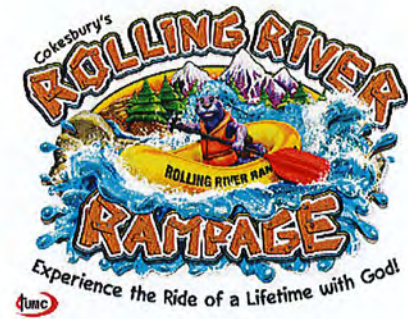

Dear Friends in Christ,

I hope that this letter finds you well and whole in the grace and mercy of God, and that you are continuing to lift your praise to God for the beauty and abundance of his creation. One of our great hymns, *For the Beauty of the Earth* (ELW #879), includes these words put to a flowing melody:

*For the wonder of each hour of the day and of the night,
hill and vale and tree and flow'r, sun and moon and stars of light:
Christ, our God, to thee we raise this our sacrifice of praise.*

I am working through three books, each of which addresses the state of our planet and the earth as an integral part of creation which God loves: *Green Like God*, by Jonathan Merrit (Faith Words, 2010); *The Very Good Gospel*, by Lisa Sharon Harper (Waterbrook, 2016); and *On Care For Our Common Home, The Encyclical Letter Laudato Si'*, by Pope Francis (Paulist Press, 2015).

The three authors, each in their own way, echo the plea of John Paul II, calling for a global ecological conversion. Harper looks to Genesis 1:26-31, reminding us that “What God calls very good is the wellness of all the relationships God created in the beginning. This includes the relationship between humanity and the rest of creation.” The care of the earth that God has entrusted to us “must bow to the will of God. And if it is to be in the image of God’s dominion, then it must be grounded in love. Love binds all creation together.” (pages 104-105)

When I was a student at The Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago from 1978-1982, one of my most vivid afternoon memories, as I sat in the library studying, was that of respected Lutheran theologian, Joseph Sittler, on his hands and knees in the seminary courtyard planting a tree with neighborhood children. I would like to have heard what Joe was teaching those children about what they were doing, and if it had an impact on their lives and on the care of God’s good earth. Joe was one of the first teachers in the church to shape a deep theology of the relationship between humanity and the earth. In his little book, *Grace Notes and Other Fragments*, Sittler writes, “I have no great expectation that human cussedness will somehow be quickly modified and turned into generosity or that humanity’s care of the earth will improve much. But I do go around planting trees on the campus.

Friends, I would encourage you to cultivate a relationship with the earth that has provided sustenance for its creatures throughout history, and that you would do this through study, conversation, and prayer; and that this relationship would lead you to exercise responsibility to care at least for a portion of creation that God has entrusted to you. Think about what you can do, and what we can do as a congregation, that might make a difference, so that Joe Sittler’s less-than-hopeful vision of the future of creation might not come true.

As we read and study and pray, let’s begin a conversation with one another about the care of the earth, and what we might begin to do as a response to the prayerful words of Francis of Assisi: *O sisters, brothers, take your part, and worship God with humble heart: Alleluia! Alleluia!* (ELW #835 v.6). Worship and praise includes living under God’s dominion and caring for all God has made.

New this year is a Plant & Garden section. Please bring any unneeded plants (in pots) and garden items during drop off times. We also are in need of baby and small children's' cloths, etc. *Thank You for supporting this Holy Trinity Fund Raiser!*

Devotions were shared on the theme, "Be patient," referring to the story of Isaac and Ishmael.

A request from the Boy Scout troop was presented to the council, asking for a space in the parking lot to locate their trailer. Other information was shared regarding the title "Scouts BSA" and dynamics surrounding that.

Gifts were presented to our music leaders at the *Celebration of Music in Praise of God* worship service. Pastor Dean Lewis will celebrate the 55th anniversary of his ordination on June 9th. The council decided to recognize this anniversary in a special way on Sunday, June 10th.

Vacation Bible School work days have been scheduled. One new teacher will be recruited for the Sunday School program.

Food that was provided for Urban Ark, through the Postal Service, is being stored at Holy Trinity, due to limited space at the Urban Ark site.

The Community Hunger Walk yielded \$12,385.75 and 1,280 pounds of food. Holy Trinity's participation included 18 walkers and two dogs. A gift of \$250.00 was received from Thrivent for the Garage Sale. We will seek to involve youth members in assisting with the sale.

We will recognize graduates in June and schedule cook-out events for the senior high and confirmation age youth.

We will work on a list of possible items for memorial gifts.

The Nominating Task Force's recommendation of Jeanette Cover, Frank Towns, and Christine Walton to be presented for election to the council was approved.

The council approved a request for the use of the building for a wedding and rehearsal on September 22nd and 23rd.

Pastor Mark reported his attendance at the National Workshop on Christian Unity in Silver Spring, Maryland on April 16-19; his attendance at the Celebration beginning the 75th Anniversary of the Diocese of Youngstown on May 20th, at Bishop Murry's invitation; his attendance at the Northeastern Ohio Synod Assembly, with Kitty Burgett and Bruce Patterson, on June 8th and 9th; and his suggestion to schedule a day-away event for the council, in order to build to build a team dynamic and do planning.

The meeting adjourned to the sanctuary for prayer.

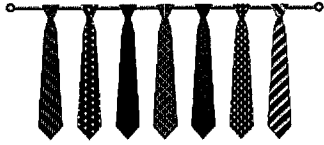
SASSY SCISSORS

Clearing Out the Spring

We are drawn to sparkling, clean bodies of water. For ages lakes, waterfalls, streams and oceans have attracted our attention and wonder. We linger on a footbridge looking over a river. We pull off the road to take photographs of lakes and streams and post online. It is scientifically agreed upon that our instincts tell us something is important about clean, free-flowing water, it is one indicator of a healthy place to live. Many species make a home near or in such water. Often an oasis for biodiversity and life. Flowing water appeals to our instincts and it is an *ecological sign*. But this same flowing water also serves as a *theological sign* of God's renewal of the church and the world. In fact, especially among Lutherans, we can say even that the flowing waters of the earth have helped inspire our own Reformation.

Springs. Have you ever drunk from a spring while camping in the forest? Or perhaps come across bubbling water coming up from a sandy bottom of a clear pool flowing out from among a crag in the rocks. Or maybe after days of filtering your water drawn from a less than pristine stream you marveled at the sweetness and simple pleasure of drinking directly from a spring.

Springs have long been signs of the goodness that mysteriously well up in our world to sustain and refresh us. Springs flow freely without any human effort but they can be polluted or forgotten. According to Lutheran theologian Gordon Lathrop Lutherans have tended to view the work of the reformation as less like repairing a malfunctioning water treatment system and more like rediscovering a live-giving spring.

The Reformation called attention to the places where God has promised a gushing spring of abundant life and grace. Sometimes, however the work of rediscovery involves work of rehabilitation. Lutheran theologian Gordon Lathrop, who has introduced this spring imagery to many, recalls "the old spring-house that used to stand on many American farms and the relatively frequent task of clearing out the weeds and junk-even the broken-down house, itself-so the water could again flow clear and accessible."

"The farmer didn't make the water. But the farmer needed to clear out the spring. Our congregations always need to be clearing out the spring." (Christian Assembly: Marks of the Church in a Pluralistic Age. Augsburg Fortress, 2004)

Lathrop suggests that "the work of reformation is not only about recalling the forgotten springs of God's abundant life. Sometimes the spring are familiar but have become obstructed or polluted. Perhaps a church practice obscures the gospel. Or, as in **Flint, Michigan**, a system of environmental racism poisons the water supply of nearly and entire city. The church is called to join the reforming work of dismantling systems and structures that pollute or impede access to the flowing springs of God's mercy."

There are many wonderful examples of this reforming work happening around the world through the ELCA right now. Members of the Southeastern Michigan Synod

are serving their neighbors in the wake of the lead-poisoned water crisis in Flint, MI by addressing the immediate need for clean drinking water in the city. Their efforts are focused through Salem Lutheran Church, Flint, distributing safe water, lead removing filters, and raising funds for new pipes and a filtration system for the church to supply water to its neighborhood throughout the 48505 zip code, as well as the larger community. ELCA Advocacy and the Southeastern Synod are collaborating as a church together, to continue to advocate for clean water for all of God's children, particularly in impoverished places or communities of color, such as Flint.

Or, In the Daurfur region, in western Sudan, there has been an ongoing state of humanitarian emergency since 2003. Though the international community has largely moved on to other crises, the conflict persists, and more than a decade after the onset of this crisis, extensive displacement continues to be one of the main features of life in Daurfur. Civil war and famine in **South Sudan** have caused nearly 5 million people to be food insecure. Rates of acute malnutrition are well over the emergency thresholds in most of the country. Declared in March of 2017 to be the first internationally declared famine anywhere in the world in the last six years. Lutheran Disaster response is committed to walking with our brothers and sisters affected by the crisis in South Sudan by responding within the country as well as across its borders. The ELCA church, because we are a church, are working with companion churches and other ecumenical partners in the region to provide care, support and hope. Operating through local partners, ELCA will accompany survivors via food distribution, shelter, water and sanitation and psycho-social support. This immediate aid is being linked to a longer-term commitment to South Sudan by ELCA World Hunger to build resilient communities and provide health care, and by ELCA's Global Church Sponsorship they are in completion of a ministry center including a health clinic.





Did you know that this June 25th - 29th Holy Trinity Lutheran Church will be hosting Summer Vacation Bible School right here in our building? The theme this year is white water rafting! It was decided that the recipient of the special offerings given would be designated to the ELCA's Clean Water Mission Program. (See ELCA Good Gifts website for lists of several initiatives.) The total cost for a simple water well can range from \$2,500 to \$10,000 depending on location of the well and cost of materials. For \$100 you can provide a portion of an irrigation canal and ensure that families in remote villages are able to grow food and our brothers and sister in drought-affected areas of the world have safe water to drink. For \$30 you can purchase a water filter to provide safe drinking water and prevent diseases like typhoid and cholera.

The Reformation called attention to the places where God has promised a gushing spring of abundant life and grace. Now congregations won't you please help by "always clearing out the spring."
